

## **BACKGROUND**

The intent of the Commission is to protect and preserve historic resources. In order to accomplish this, owners of designated historic sites are required to obtain a Certificate of Appropriateness from the Historic Preservation Commission before they make alterations to the exterior of their property. Demolition of historic structures is also regulated.

In 2002-2006, the City of Sheboygan undertook an intensive survey report which provides an historical context for the evaluation of historic resources. This survey serves as a means of identifying significant properties and districts eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places.

A copy of this report is available for viewing at the Department of Planning and Development and the Mead Public Library.


## **HISTORIC PRESENTATION**

### **Effect of the Ordinance**

The regulatory decisions of the Historic Preservation Commission can be appealed to the Sheboygan Common Council. The Common Council meets the first and third Monday of each month.
